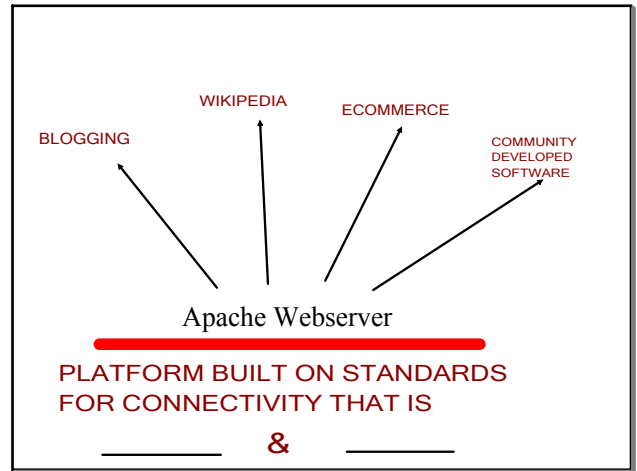

## Development of Apache Webserver

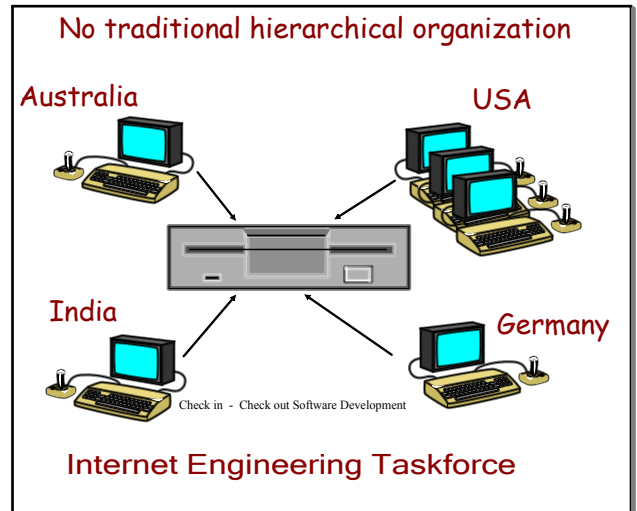
National Center for Supercomputing Applications (NCSA) at the U of I manages most commonly used web server software
